Introduction

The challenge ahead

The challenge facing local government is immense, as we seek to balance the books in the face of further cuts in government grant. In 2011/12 we lost £1,095,987 in grant. In 2012/13 from that new baseline we lost £846,000, and in 2013/14 another £467,000. In 2014/15 we have another significant cut and will lose at least another £700,000. The base revenue budget has gone from £12,595,000 in 2011/12 to £10,990,000 in 2013/14.

In spite of this we have not cut services and we have not made anyone compulsorily redundant, although the number of employees has reduced from 772 in 2009/10 to 725 in 2011/12. Healthy leisure centre attendance has helped increase income - by £375,000 over the last three years. On refuse collection, we have over the last 4 years saved/generated £682,000 additional income.

Shared services are just one of the techniques we have used to reduce costs. We now manage the CCTV service for Ashfield, Newark & Sherwood and parts of Bolsover as well as ours, saving at least £30,000 a year. We manage the ICT service for Broxtowe, Newark and Sherwood and Rushcliffe. This partnership will save at least £800,000 over the next five years, through the ICT initiative.

Similarly, we provide estates services to Ashfield, but we buy in non-domestic rates services from them. Our crematorium and cemeteries management is shared with Erewash Borough Council, so we receive a contribution to those costs. We contribute to the costs of tackling

applications which resulted in over £240,000 worth of projects, including a project run by the YMCA to help teenagers integrate better with the civilian community, as well as projects to improve access to Chetwynd Barracks for families and personnel, a 'Forces in the Community' central hub to provide support, training and signposting to veterans and their families and outdoor play activities on Manor

Farm recreation ground.

- Make it clear that people who have experienced mental health issues will not be discriminated against and that disclosure of a mental health problem will enable both the employee and us to assess and provide the right level of support or adjustment.
- Not make assumptions that a person with a

mental health issue will be more vulnerable to workplace stress or take more time off than any other employee or job applicant

- Provide nonjudgemental and proactive support to individual staff who experience mental health issues
- Ensure all line managers have information and training about managing mental health in the workplace.

The Council, in partnership with ACAS, has already offered 5 one day courses on Mental Health Awareness to employees this year.

First Bricks Mark New Housing Development

FAMILIES looking to setup home in Broxtowe Borough received a welcome boost in September as the first bricks were laid on a new housing development at Midland Road, Eastwood.

Mayor of the Borough of Broxtowe, Councillor Iris White was joined by Leader of the Council, Councillor Milan Radulovic to lay the first bricks during the ceremony, along with representatives from the contractor, Midlands based Waters Homes. The properties, on the former garage site on Midland Road, consist of two family homes and four bungalows and are one of four social housing projects currently under construction in the Borough, worth over £6 million.

These new homes are just part of the Council's plan to develop sites and build affordable homes throughout the Borough, with other projects to be developed on sites in Chilwell and Stapleford.

Broxtowe Youth Homelessness



Stapleford-based charity, Broxtowe Youth Homelessness have been awarded BIG Lottery funding to help support their work for the next three years.

The charity provides home starter packs, emergency food and toiletry parcels and produce a magazine for young people. They also help deliver awareness-raising 'Home Street Home' workshops in secondary schools to help prevent homelessness amongst young people.

Retirement Living

Following an extensive review in 2011/12 and a rebranding exercise a new 'Retirement Living' team was created to support independent living for older people and to develop initiatives and promote the Broxtowe Borough Retirement Living concept more widely.

Lots of exciting projects are planned and the first of many was a Retirement Living Open Day at Yew Tree Court and Westbourne Court in celebration of older people's week. The week coincided with National Older People's Day. Lots of activities took place including cinema afternoons, fitness events from crazy golf and wii sports to a games afternoon, scheme olympics and a circus workshop. A learning to 'surf the net' event was also held, followed by an afternoon talk on researching family history.

South Nottinghamshire Community Safety Partnership is one of Broxtowe Borough's most successful partnerships. It co-ordinates community safety issues in the three boroughs of Rushcliffe, Broxtowe and Gedling.

Money Matters 2012/13 Annual Report Summary

Each year Broxtowe Borough Council must decide how it will spend the money it receives from the council tax you pay and the government grant we receive.

BUDGET CONSULTATION

As with all other local authorities the Council is expecting to see government funding cut significantly over the next two years by well over 25% and will have to reduce its spending accordingly.

Your views are important to us in helping to identify areas where we should look to cut costs or raise new income.

GENERAL FUND

This covers all the day-to-day running costs of the Council's services with the exception of council housing. It includes salaries and wages, fuel, transport and general office running costs as well as income from fees and charges.



The main spending areas include: refuse collection and recycling, leisure centres, community events, street cleansing, crime and disorder, interest payable on outstanding loans and parks and open spaces. Over £29.7 million was spent on housing and council tax benefits. This is almost all reimbursed to the authority by the government. In 2012/13 the Council spent £11.208 million on General Fund services after taking account of all of the income received.

The Council receives a grant from the government towards the cost of these services, which includes an element to reflect income collected from business rates up and down the country. Council tax meets over one third of the cost of the services. The level of council tax is set by the Council each year and amounts payable by individual households vary according to what part of the borough the property is in and the value of the property. The latter is used by the Valuation Office to place each property in one of eight bands for council tax purposes.

In 2012/13 income exceeded expenditure by $\pounds 0.500$ million and this was added to the Council's reserves, which totalled $\pounds 3.387$ million at the end of 2012/13.

The expenditure of £11.208 million represented an under spend of £0.890 million against the budget. A number of factors contributed to the under spend including savings on employee costs and additional income, as well as a reduction in the residual costs of housing and council tax benefits. Part of the under spend, totalling £0.369 million, has been carried forward to 2013/14 to enable work originally planned for 2012/13 to be completed.



CAPITAL SPENDING

In 2012/13 £3.335 million of the financing for capital projects came from the Major Repairs reserve. Significant expenditure was financed from other grants and contributions including sums received from the Homes and Communities Agency towards the building of new homes and from Growth Point towards major environmental schemes and from the East Midlands Regional Housing Board to increase the proportion of vulnerable households in the private sector that live in decent homes.

Shortfalls in funding to meet the cost of the capital projects are generally met from additional borrowing. New borrowing of £2.159 million was taken in 2012/13 to bring the overall level of borrowing to £90.329 million at 31 March 2013. Interest payable on this borrowing is included within the General Fund or Housing Revenue Account as appropriate.

Capital Spending in 2012/13 included £3.027 million on a housing modernisation programme and £1.708 million on gas and energy improvements to maintain the council housing stock at or above the Decent Homes Standard plus £0.483 million on grants to help the disabled to remain in their own homes. The 2012/13 capital spending of £2.733 million represented an under spend of £2.733 million compared with the capital programme. A sum of £2.666 million has been carried forward to 2013/14 to enable capital schemes that commenced in 2012/13 to be completed.

HOUSING REVENUE ACCOUNT

This account relates to the day-to-day costs and income in respect of council housing. Income is predominantly from council house and garage rents. The Council fixes rent levels annually, although those relating to housing are based upon guidance issued by the government. This guidance takes account of the size and assessed value of the properties in auestion.

Over a quarter of the expenditure is on day-to-day repairs and maintenance of the housing stock. This is in addition to the more substantial modernisation schemes. At 31 March 2013 the Council's housing stock totalled 4,627 properties.

In 2012/13 income exceeded expenditure by £2.496 million and this was added to the Housing Revenue Account balance, which totalled £3.344 million at the end of the year.

The Housing Revenue Account outturn for 2012/13 showed an under spend of £1.888 million against the revised budget. A sum of £0.188 million has been carried forward to 2013/14 to enable schemes that commenced in 2012/13 to be completed.
