Earlier in the summer, we joined other Members and Senior Officers across the Borough as part of our Let's Talk Broxtowe Consultation. It was great to see and speak to so many of you at these events.

It's always really important to hear your feedback and ideas, as this will feed in to our new Corporate Plan and help set the Council's priorities over the next few years.

We are continuing to progress with meeting our Climate Change targets for 2027 with a new refreshed Climate Change and Green Futures Strategy, which has been streamlined with ten key strategy themes identified as the priority areas. This includes 104 actions to help us address the complex and dynamic nature of climate change. With this in mind, the strategy is a live working document that is revised on a regular basis and we will be asking residents for their ideas and feedback in spring 2024.

We also received the news that our Nottinghamshire Partnership for Notts Green Rewards to tackle climate change won Best Collaborative Working Initiative in the APSE Service Awards. To date, Green Rewards has nearly 7,000 members and together they have undertaken 261,500 actions, which has avoided emitting nearly 762 tonnes of carbon. That's the equivalent of charging 92,691,696 phones or not driving

1,953,4242 miles in an average petrol powered car. That distance is the equivalent of driving round the earth over 78 times!

75 Stapleford businesses have now benefitted from a £1m Towns Fund grant scheme to revitalise the local economy. As part of Kimberley's £16.5m Levelling Up Fund, projects are progressing including a Cycle Path Network and Bennerley Viaduct Eastern Ramp, Town Centre Improvement Project, Digby Street Industrial Units and new sports facilities. Across the wider Borough, the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF) has helped projects including support for the development of a community hub at Durban House, Eastwood.

Although we are now in the winter months there's lots to look forward to across the Borough as our Christmas Lights Switch On events return with lots of festive cheer for you and all the family.

Moving to Universal Credit

The Department for Works and Pensions (DWP) is continuing with the migration to Universal Credit. From September 2023, the DWP aims to commence the migration of those households that are receiving Tax Credits (Working Tax Credit and/or Child Tax Credit). All households receiving these benefits will be contacted as they aim to move them to Universal Credit. Where these households apply for Universal Credit, the DWP will conduct an assessment and if the amount of benefit they receive is due to reduce, they will award a transitional protection.

This is a continuation of the natural migration that has been in place for several years. In the financial year 2024/25, the DWP has proposed the migration of all remaining legacy benefit cases to Universal Credit.

Cost of Living Payment

Households on means-tested benefits, including Universal Credit, Pension Credit and Tax Credits, will receive an additional payment of



Universal

£900 this year, paid automatically in three instalments.

The £900 will be paid to over eight million eligible meanstested benefits claimants. Starting in Spring, it will go direct to bank accounts in three payments split over the course of the next year through to Spring 2024.

There will also be a separate $\pounds150$ for over six million disabled people, and $\pounds300$ for over eight million pensioners on top of their Winter Fuel Payments.

Energy Saving Tips

There are things we can all do, no matter what our budget to be more energy efficient – some require an initial cost but many are completely free and can often save you money too!

Keeping warm

 Turning your thermostat down by just 1°C can save you as much as £80 per year.



- Layer up, wear an extra jumper and pair of socks around the house.
- Close off any unused rooms.

In the kitchen

- Using a slow cooker to cook throughout the day only use about as much energy as a light bulb.
- When boiling food in a pan, only use the amount of water needed to cover the food you're cooking.
- Only fill your kettle up with the water that you need.



- Use glass or ceramic dishes in the oven wherever possible as they retain heat better than their metal counterparts
- Ninety per cent of a washing machine's energy expenditure is spent heating the water, so if you wash your clothes at 30°C you can save a third on your washing bills.

Save gas and electricity

- Install a smart meter. By clearly indicating where you're spending the most on your energy, you can take steps to cut down usage wherever possible and save money.
- Don't leave anything plugged in that isn't being used.



- Turn the lights off when you leave a room.
- Taking a 4 minute shower opposed could save up to £131 per person per year (based on the current price of 34p kWh).

Having problems with your neighbours, landlord or within your household?

What is Mediation?

Mediation is a process whereby someone not involved in a dispute and not known to the people involved, acts as a go-between to help the people involved come to a solution which they can agree on. The emphasis is placed on those involved to find their own solution and be guided by the mediator.

The mediation uses techniques to facilitate communication, problem solving and negotiation between parties in a safe and constructive environment.

The mediator will not take sides or tell someone what to do, but will help participants reach a mutually agreeable solution to the issue faced.



When can Mediation be used?

Neighbour Mediation

Mediation is a well-established method of resolving conflict between neighbours. The mediator acts as an impartial third party to help in disagreements to find a mutually acceptable way forward.

Neighbourhood Mediation

Offered to residents in situations where many neighbours and parties are involved. It works on the principle that the community is best to resolve disputes within it.

Household or Landlord Mediation

This type of mediation centres around conflicts that relate to home

and property, generally where family members or landlords are no longer willing to accommodate another person, potentially risking homelessness.

Broxtowe Mediation Partnership cannot act in disputes between those in a relationship, where Courts are involved or in custody arrangements of children.

What is Mediation process?

Following receipt of a referral, one of the trained mediators will contact the parties involved, preferably by telephone, to introduce themselves, ascertain more fully the background to the dispute and make arrangements for the first meeting.



Meetings do not always have to include all parties involved face to face at all times, we understand that relationships between people could have deteriorated to the point where this is too difficult, certainly at first.

Mediation appointments are available in person or over virtual meetings. The Broxtowe Mediation Partnership has a number of locations appropriate for meetings including in Stapleford, Beeston and Eastwood.

The aim following a mediation process is to reach a proposed mutually acceptable Mediation Agreement that will be prepared and circulated to all parties involved for their approval.

Referrals can be made by individuals or by agencies on a client's behalf such as the Council or Police.

Climate Change and Green Futures

In July 2019, the Council declared a 'Climate Change Emergency' and committed to becoming carbon neutral by 2027 for its own operations.

Consequently, a Climate Change and Green Futures Delivery Programme was developed in 2020 to allow us to act immediately and deliver an effective strategy to reduce the Council's carbon footprint.

Climate change is a complex and changing dynamic and therefore our strategy is a live working document that is revised on a regular basis, ensuring it remains up to date and relevant. The most recent update is now complete, resulting in our Climate Change and Green Futures Strategy 2023-2027 with 104 actions as part of our revised carbon management plan. Nottinghamshire Climate Change Partnership wins award

Notts Green Rewards win an APSE Service Award in the category 'Best Collaborative Working Initiative'

A Nottinghamshire partnership to tackle climate change has won Best Collaborative Working Initiative in the APSE Service Awards.

Green Rewards, an online platform which helps Nottinghamshire and Nottingham City residents take action to reduce their carbon footprint and to help tackle climate change received the award last week.

The initiative allows residents to accumulate points for undertaking sustainable actions which lower their carbon footprint and in turn helps to tackle climate change. The programme also captures the user's carbon avoidance metrics; helping support the Nottinghamshire Partners commitments to work towards becoming carbon neutral.

To date, Green Rewards has nearly 7000 members and together have undertaken 261,500 actions, which has avoided emitting nearly 762 tonnes of carbon. That's the equivalent of charging 92,691,696 phones1 or not driving 1,953,4242 miles in an average petrol powered car. That distance is the equivalent of driving round the earth over 78 times!

In October 2021, seven Nottinghamshire District Councils, Nottinghamshire County Council, Nottingham City Council, the University of Nottingham, Nottingham Trent University and platform creator Jump joined together to create the trailblazing Green Rewards partnership. Nottinghamshire is the first County in the country to see all its local authority and education partners collaborate on a climate change reduction project in this way.

How we're providing value for money 2022/23 Annual Report Summary

This summary outlines how we spent the money received from the Council Tax you pay, business rates, Government grants and other income during the 2022/23 financial year.

General Fund

How the money was raised

£6.1m from Council Tax

£3.9m from our share of Business Rates

Total Income: £10.3million

Where the money was spent



Day to day running costs of Council services (except Council Housing) e.g. salaries, premises costs, energy, transport, supplies, other general running costs and income from fees and charges.

The Council spent a net ± 0.3 m more than it received in funding and ± 2.1 m less than it planned to spend.

Where does your Council Tax go?

Council Tax is set annually and the money you pay is used to fund local services. Around 8% of your Council Tax goes towards funding services provided by Broxtowe Borough Council. The rest goes to Nottinghamshire County Council, Nottinghamshire Police, Nottinghamshire Fire and Rescue and your Parish Council.

We collect Council Tax for all of these organisations but each is responsible for deciding its own rates. Based on a Band D equivalent:

£1,723.66 goes to Nottinghamshire County Council.

£269.19 goes to Nottinghamshire Police.

£182.06 goes to Broxtowe Borough Council.

£89.57 goes to Nottinghamshire Fire and Rescue.

Parish precepts vary between each Parish.

Please note this is based on your 2023/24 Council Tax.

Good Ideas Fund

Community projects have benefited from a share of Broxtowe's £313,650 UK Shared Prosperity Funding (UKSPF).

A project to provide day trips for up to 120 people with dementia and their carers is one of 30 projects to receive a share of the Government funding.

Stapleford Towns Fund helps business bounce back

Seventy-five Stapleford businesses are benefitting from a £1m Towns Fund grant scheme to revitalise the local economy.

Recipients of the Government fund include Peak My Body, Wake Cup Café, Millepede micropub, Affinity Dance School and Little Driver's Play Centre.

Grants have funded building and signage work to modernise premises and improve the look of the high street, decoration, accessibility and energy efficiency improvements, equipment and marketing.

Mike Millers of Peak My Body, said: "The business grant has helped grow membership of the gym and install app access for members so they can

come to the gym around their own schedules. It would have taken eight to twelve months to do this on my own, the scheme has been fantastic."

This scheme is one of six being delivered through Stapleford's £21m Towns Fund. Other projects include a new learning facility and cycling facilities which are already complete, and an enterprise hub building and community pavilion and young people's centre which are coming soon. New Electric Bikes Helping Officers Tackle Crime Across Eastwood



Police say Safer Streets electric bicycles have been 'invaluable' in tackling drug dealing in Eastwood after being used to make seven arrests and make 11 stop searches.



The electric bikes are brand new additions to the Broxtowe neighbourhood policing team thanks to the Safer Streets funding and are available for officers to use alongside two other e-bikes already being used in the district.

Officers in Eastwood have been able to hit the beat with two new electric bicycles which is helping to increase community engagement and chase down criminals in an effort to put a stop to antisocial behaviour.

Officers have been able to speak with residents and shoppers more easily along Eastwood high street as the bicycles allow for much swifter patrols and a more intimate dialogue with members of the public. They also mean officers can pursue suspects down tight alley ways and hard-to-reach places, giving them a better chance of catching those committing crimes and antisocial behaviour in Eastwood.

The purchase of the two new electric bicycles has been made possible after the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner for Nottinghamshire secured £3 million of Home Office funding for Safer

Streets projects that help reduce neighbourhood crime and antisocial behaviour, as well as violence against women and girls. The project has been delivered in partnership with Nottinghamshire Police and local authorities, including Broxtowe Borough Council.

Eastwood is just one of a number of areas across Nottinghamshire that is benefiting from a share of Safer Streets funding, secured by the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner for Nottinghamshire.

Safer Streets funding is also being used to fund the installation of CCTV and automatic number plate recognition cameras in Eastwood, as well as improvements to lighting and car park security to prevent vehicle crime.

Officers have utilised the new bikes for over 1,400 hours since they were purchased in October 2022, resulting in them being used for an average of 30 hours per week. The ability to keep fit and active whilst on the beat. They have also been used to help gather intelligence that has led to drug warrants being carried out.

The cost-ofliving crisis and economic abuse



As the cost-of-living crisis continues to affect families across the country, Broxtowe Women's Project has been considering the impact on people affected by domestic abuse in the area.

Economic abuse is a form of controlling and coercive behaviour involving money or finances. This could include income, spending, bank accounts, bills and borrowing. It also encompasses the control of things like employment, housing and resources. It creates economic instability or dependence for victims.

According to national charity, Surviving Economic Abuse, 95% of cases of domestic abuse involve economic abuse. Their recent report, 'Seen yet sidelined', outlines how the criminal justice system is not holding perpetrators to account or effectively supporting survivors.

Broxtowe Women's Project can work with businesses and organisations to support their employees and service users who may be experiencing economic abuse, particularly in the current cost-of-living crisis. This could include holding awareness sessions, signposting to relevant support agencies locally and nationally, advising on policies and procedures in the workplace to better support staff, and offering confidential support and information.

22 Housing - Broxtowe Matters

There are big changes happening in Social Housing

Following the tragic events of Grenfell, the Government have introduced the new Social Housing (Regulation) Act 2023. This signifies a new era for social housing, ensuring that landlords are delivering a quality housing service and are fully accountable to their tenants.

There are now stronger powers for the Regulator of Social Housing to utilise. The key changes include:

- New regulatory regime and a review of the Consumer Standards

 this introduces new Tenant Satisfaction Measures that all social landlords will need to ask tenants about and report back to the Regulator annually, and a new set of Consumer Standards that the Regulator will check performance against.
- Housing Ombudsman given additional powers to publish best practice guidance to landlords following investigations into tenant complaints.



- Awaab's Law following the tragic death of Awaab Ishak, this gives the Regulator powers to set strict time limits for landlords to address hazards including damp and mould.
- · Inspections of Social Housing landlords by the Regulator.
- Decent Home Standard Review.
- Professionalism requiring housing providers to ensure their managers hold relevant qualifications and update their training when necessary. This will ensure that managers have the skills and knowledge to provide a good quality and effective housing service.
- Electrical Safety Consultation.

Damp and Mould If you're a Housing tenant and spot damp or mould you need to act fast

Mould needs to be treated before it causes harm to you or others in your home.

Condensation is the most common form of damp in homes. It happens when moisture in the air meets a cold surface. A build-up of condensation in your home can lead to mould. Everyday activities like cooking, having a bath or shower and drying clothes can create moisture.

How to tackle small amounts of mould yourself

If you're worried about mould, we want you to contact us. However, if you feel confident to tackle small amounts yourself, please follow these tips:

- Open windows and close the door in the room you're cleaning
- Wear protective gloves and a face mask
- Use a domestic cleaning product or mould remover and follow the manufacturer's instructions carefully
- Clean all surfaces in the room to remove spores that have spread
- Dry any surfaces to remove excess moisture after cleaning
- **Do not** use a vacuum cleaner on the affected area
- **Do not** use bleach as this can sometimes make the situation worse
- **Do not** use washing up liquid as it will not be strong enough

There are three key ways you can manage the presence of mould in your home:

 Controlling condensation – wipe condensation away from windows and sills each morning; try not to dry clothes inside without opening a window, do not put clothes directly on radiators; cook using pan lids; run cold water in the bath first to reduce steam; close the bathroom door when using the bath or shower

- Ventilation open windows; ensure air vents are unobstructed; use extractor fans; ensure window vents are always open
- Heating use your thermostat to keep a constant temperature (18-21 degrees Celsius is ideal).

You are not alone. We understand that with the increasing cost of energy, some people may find it difficult to heat their homes. If you are struggling and you are a Broxtowe Council tenant, please contact the Housing Financial Inclusion team for further advice and support (email financial. inclusion@broxtowe.gov.uk or call 0115 917 7777). If you have condensation, damp or mould, it is important that you let us know if it is not improving, is at an advanced stage or you believe it is due to a building defect such as a leak or rising damp. You can email Housing Repairs on **damp&mould@ broxtowe.gov.uk** and if possible, please attach photos to the email which show clear, close-up detail of the affected areas and a wider view of the area. You can also call the team on **0115 917 7777 option 2**.
