This would attract people with money to spend time in Beeston as Trams cater for wheelchair users. I am concerned that there appears to be no standard accessible toilet which is a legal requirement and I would strongly urge that a Changing Places toilet be included. Nottingham has 2 great hospitals that do amazing work in saving lives but the consequence is that because of such hospitals well over 250,000 people live in the community but they cannot access shops, leisure activities and do the things we take for granted because they need this new type of disabled toilet with equipment and space. There are numerous options for cinema goers in the area, and I don't therefore feel that having a cinema within Beeston would make local people stay in Beeston to watch a film, nor do I think it would attract people from outside the town to come to it when there are options such as Savoy, Showcase within easy reach Food & drink venues The number of empty units on the high street (and ease with which one can get a table at the restaurant, cafe, bar options available) suggests that Beeston is not saturated in terms of such venues, and in fact development of additional such outlets in a development on the bus station site is either likely to be unsuccessful in itself (leading to a desolate building with a large number of vacant units, such as the clocktower area of the Victoria Centre in Nottingham) or have a negative impact on the high street businesses. In fact BBC's previous consultation on the use of the Town Hall (a similar distance from the high street to the phase 2 development) stated that "In our opinion, a café operation in this location would not assist with maintaining footfall on the high street and would therefore have a negative impact on what is trying to be achieved within Beeston town centre itself." I assume that a modern development like this is more likely to attract national/international chains with the capital to invest.
