

Promising progress has been made over the past year, towards making **Broxtowe a great place** to live, work and spend leisure time...

Our Pride in Parks scheme has already seen over £160,000 invested in improvements to parks and open spaces across the Borough and with a further £340,000 ear marked over the next two years, all our residents will have access to improved outdoor facilities. We've also been working to communicate better with residents from across the local community to make sure that they can access the services they need and have their say on future service provision including on things like registering to vote, universal credit and the budget.



A number of community based initiatives have also been successful this year including our local lottery scheme, The Broxtowe Lotto, which has been very positively received and thanks to your support raised over £5,000 for local good causes in the first week. It's on track to raise £18,000 annually for these good causes.

Whilst all local authorities still face financial challenges, the Council's outturn financial position at the end of 2017/18 was positive and put us in good stead for the future.

Thanks to good performance in a number of areas, working in a more commercially minded way and using our assets effectively, the Council is well placed to meet the medium term financial challenges and deliver on its priorities to provide good quality homes, protect the environment, make people feel safe, improve our town centres and make people healthier.

Broxtowe Lotto Supporting The Community

£18,000 is on track to be raised annually for local good causes thanks to the Broxtowe Lotto – a new local lottery scheme.

The Broxtowe Lotto works by allowing people to buy tickets to support a good cause of their choice from those registered with the lotto. That cause will get 50p of every ticket sold. A further 10p will go into a general good causes fund which will be allocated by the Council. The remaining 40p goes towards prizes and operating costs. Over 20 good causes are already signed up.

40 years of Twinning

Broxtowe Twinning Association celebrated is 40th anniversary recently. The twinning club began as a table tennis club in 1978 and friendships were made. When the table tennis declined, the friendships remained and the twinning is now a friendship club. Every year since the initial visit in 1978 the club meet up for a few days in Germany and England -alternating each year. This year their visit to Germany included a walking tour of Gütersloh, a visit to Dusseldorf Parliament, a civic reception, music in the park, family meals and gatherings - ending with our usual final night party and presentation evening. Plans will now begin for the visit of German friends to England in 2019.



Local Plan update

The Broxtowe Part 2 Local Plan has been submitted to the Secretary of State to be examined by an Independent Planning Inspector.

The Part 2 Local Plan allocates sites for new housing development in Awsworth, Beeston, Bramcote, Brinsley, Chilwell, Eastwood, Kimberley, Stapleford and Toton. It also includes more detailed policies on

a number of key issues such as design, heritage, retail, green infrastructure, landscape and biodiversity against which planning applications will be assessed.

The Planning Inspector will now hold public hearing sessions to discuss the key issues and topics in order to ensure that the Plan meets its Legal Requirements and is 'sound'.

Countdown to Universal Credit

Universal Credit (UC) is now available in the north of the Borough for those living in the area served by Heanor Job Centre and Beeston Job Centre will be offering UC from November 2018 onwards.

Universal Credit replaces:

- Housing Benefit
- Jobseeker's Allowance
- Employment and Support Allowance
- Income Support
- Working Tax Credit
- Child Tax Credit

Visit www.gov.uk/universal-credit/eligibility to find out if you're eligible for UC. Council Tax

Support is not included in UC, so residents will need to still claim via the Council for this benefit.

The Council is working closely with the Job Centre and Citizens Advice to support people through the change. Council Tenants can also make an appointment with the Financial Inclusion Officer for financial and budgeting advice.

Dr. Janjua

Director and senior Optometrist at John Flynn Opticians, Sheeraz Janjua was recently awarded the degree of Doctor of Optometry from Aston University for his research in Dry eye syndrome. 

Together they have organised social activities, litter picks, entertainment evenings and day trips as well as supporting the most isolated residents in their homes. 18 regular

activities have been set up over the last year giving residents the opportunity to socialise, make friends and feel more connected to their communities.

Are you contaminating your recycling bin?

We know our residents like to recycle with over 6,000 tonnes of recyclables collected by the Council each year. However, just one wrong item in your green-lidded recycling bin may mean we can't recycle anything in it.

To help our residents put the 'Right Waste' in the 'Right Bin' we have recently put recycling stickers on all green-lidded recycling bins showing which items can go in them.

The most common items which are incorrectly recycled in the green-lidded bin are:

- Nappies and food waste
 cannot be recycled and
 - should be placed in your black-lidded bin
- Glass should be recycled in your glass bag or red-lidded bin
- Textiles can be recycled in bags left out with your glass collection

Refreshed play areas

Play areas at Central Avenue Recreation Ground in Stapleford, Salcey Drive in Trowell and Jubilee Park in Eastwood have been given a refresh with a full jet wash of all equipment and rubber surfacing.

Pictured on the front cover, a complete refurbishment has transformed this popular play area as part of the first major improvement works on the site in over 20 years. Improvements include new multi-play areas for juniors and toddlers, new swings, trampoline, seesaw, balance beams and spring riders, as well as a 4 metre high play dome.

The Borough's three Community Green Flag sites also retained their flags at Alexandrina Plantation and Sandy Lane Local Nature Reserve (10th consecutive year), Brinsley Headstocks Local Nature Reserve and Bramcote Old Church Tower.

Poppy streams honour World War Centenary





A poppy stream was a poignant tribute to those who lost their lives during the First World War when it flowered at Hall Om Wong Park in Kimberley just in time for the Freedom Parade back in June. Sadly, mother nature wasn't so kind to the poppy stream in King George's Park in Bramcote but commemorative events at the site still provided a fitting tribute to our fallen soldiers.







New Fines For Car Litterers



People who throw litter from their vehicles will face tougher fines, thanks to new powers awarded to local authorities.

The legislation means that for the first time Councils will be able to impose fines on the owners of vehicles from which litter is thrown, even if it was discarded by someone else. These new fines will make sure the perpetrators, not the local community, bear the cost of keeping our streets and roads clean.

The fixed penalties will be £75 but if not paid within 28 days, this amount will double to £150.

Top Safety Tips This Winter

During darker nights and festive celebrations, follow these simple safety tips from The South Nottinghamshire Community Safety Partnership so you don't become the victim of crime this winter.

Going out

- · Ensure doors, gates and windows are locked
- · Invest in a security light and set a burglar alarm
- · Don't leave Christmas presents on view

Whilst shopping

- Keep handbags, purses and wallets secure, out of sight and never unattended.
- · Always close car windows and lock doors
- Park in a well-lit area, or a car park displaying

Cash points

- Don't use a cash point if you see anything suspicious
- · Ensure your PIN cannot be seen
- · Avoid carrying large amounts of cash

When out at night

- Ensure someone knows where you are and when you'll be home
- · Don't leave bags unattended
- Drink responsibly, never accept drinks from strangers, don't leave drinks unattended
- · Don't drink and drive
- Don't use unlicensed taxis
- Never walk home alone, don't use alleys or walk across open spaces, stick to well-lit areas

Supporting Broxtowe Businesses

Beeston Square plans given the go ahead

Planning Committee unanimously granted full consent for Beeston's new cinema and outline planning consent for the mixed use and residential building.

The development will include 120 new homes, a cinema and a number of new food and drink outlets.

The application was submitted back in May after a public consultation on the designs, with more than 150 local residents giving their views on the plans.

The Council will now be working to secure a developer for the residential part of the site, along with operators for the leisure facilities.



Nottingham 26 Development

The Nottingham 26 development on the outer edge of Eastwood is progressing significantly with two of the three units now substantially completed.

The 55 acre site is located close to junction 26 of the M1 motorway, accessed via the A610 dual carriageway. Both smaller units occupy a prominent roadside position, fronting the A610 and benefit from ample parking facilities with potential for more if needed.

The larger unit, is the biggest single new build warehouse in the East Midlands at 550 000sq ft. Once occupied, the three units will provide a huge boost to the local economy in terms of jobs in the Borough.



Eldon Road Industrial Estate

New businesses are set to move into the Borough and create more jobs, following a full refurbishment, of commercial space in Attenborough.

The 31,000 square foot of commercial space at Eldon Road has benefitted from refurbishments worth a six figure sum.

New Car Park in Beeston

A new car park has opened at Technology Drive, adjacent to Beeston train station.

The new car park offers 62 parking spaces, of which 6 are dedicated to blue badge holders, with the added bonus of:

- The latest Pay & Display machines which accept payment in coins, by bank card, by contactless cards and Apple pay
- · Pay by Phone facilities
- Facilities to park and pay for multiple days in one transaction
- Energy efficient lighting and surveillance cameras to ensure the safety and security of car park users
- Dedicated bicycle storage area
- Step free access to the train station's platform 2 for wheelchair and buggy users

Housing Systems Upgrade

House Building

We have recently commissioned an external organisation to undertaken a Housing Needs Survey and House Building Delivery Plan. As part of this work, they will:

- Establish current and projected social and affordable housing need over the next 10 years.
- Identify how this need will be met by the housing market, registered social landlords and other partners.

- Better understand the intentions of registered providers when it comes to future affordable house building.
- Identify the need for provision of specialist accommodation for particular groups e.g. people with disabilities, older people, key workers.
- Consider the land and financing options to fund a house building delivery programme.

The report will be completed in December and presented to Housing Committee.



Estate Walkabouts

Tenant & Leaseholders are invited to join Housing Officers on inspections of their estates.

Officers from the Housing Department carry out inspections on Council housing estates throughout the year. Having tenants and leaseholders involved in these inspections help to highlight areas of concern that may be causing issues within the community, which officers may not be aware of, including:

- What matters most to you about the area you live in?
- Are there areas that need to be tidied up?

Having someone local to the area attend does make a significant different and results in positive actions on the estates.

Welcome to Independent Living

Following the commissioning of an external review by HQN of the Retirement Living Service, a new model was proposed and accepted unanimously by the Housing Committee in June.

The review involved an extensive process of engagement with employees, residents and Councillors. The key changes to the service involve:

- A new staffing structure for employees who will be renamed "Independent Living Co-ordinators". The employees will have new job descriptions. The new structure saves over £200,000 in a full year.
- The new Independent Living Co-ordinators will focus solely on relationships with tenants in order to support them to remain independent. Other aspects of work which they did previously, including health and safety checks on premises and organising social activities for residents, will pass to new specialist officers.
- Each resident in Independent Living accommodation will be offered an individual needs assessment and an action plan to assist them to remain independent.

Newsletters have been distributed to residents in our schemes telling them of the new service and inviting them to "meet the manager" sessions to explain more about the changes.

Garage Improvements

Work has commenced to refurbish garage sites across the Borough.

A number of sites have already been completed, with 43 garages refurbished across four sites and six garages replaced at Gregory Court, Chilwell.

Moving forward, sites containing prefabricated garages are being looked at with a view to demolishing existing garages and replacing them with new ones. Sites containing brick built garages are being considered for refurbishment. This will include replacing existing

roof coverings, fascias, guttering, rainwater pipes and painting doors and frames. Where needed, repointing work will be completed.

Make Your Home Safe


October has been Home Security Awareness Month - a reminder to everyone to check and, if needed, to take measures to increase it.

During the month, Broxtowe Borough Council and Broxtowe Women's Project (BWP) have been working to help those affected make their home as secure as possible.

The campaign has and continues to recommend those affected to take measures such as:

- get locks changed if needed (free for Council tenants);
- make sure smoke and carbon monoxide alarms work;
- have a fireproof letter box;
- shred documents rather than putting them in a bin;



turn off location services on phones.

BWP raises awareness through practical demonstrations to help survivors of domestic abuse make their house safer.
