Toton and Chetwynd Consultation

Ambitious plans to create jobs, housing and transport links, connecting old and new communities on the borders of Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire over the next 20 years were unveiled in November.

Residents around Toton, Chilwell, Attenborough, Stapleford, Sandiacre and Long Eaton, as well as the surrounding areas, are being asked by Broxtowe Borough Council for their views on a Strategic Masterplan for the development of the area. The consultation will run until midnight on Monday 13 December.

The scheduled closure of the historic Chetwynd Barracks in 2024 and any proposed transport works around the potential Toton East Midlands Hub, provide a once in a lifetime opportunity to map out the future for the area, create cycle pathways, green spaces, new schools, healthcare facilities and modern communities, which offer affordable and carbon neutral homes.

Leaflets will be sent to over 80,000 residents over the coming weeks asking for their views. People can view the plans and leave their comments in a 'virtual' display room https://toton-and-chetwynd.virtual-engage.com

The proposals for Toton and Chetwynd also form part of an ambitious long-term vision for the future of the regional economy which is being developed under the banner of the proposed East Midlands Development Corporation.

The vision will see coordinated development around Toton and Chetwynd, Ratcliffe-on-Soar Power Station and East Midlands Airport, with the aim of creating 84,000 jobs and adding £4.8bn to the value of the regional economy.

The Masterplan has been developed over the last four years by Broxtowe Borough Council and Nottinghamshire County Council, supported by Erewash Borough Council and Derbyshire County Council.

Protect Yourself from Flu

This winter more than ever, with COVID-19 still circulating, we need to help reduce all avoidable risks.

You can help protect the NHS, social care and loved ones by getting the flu vaccine.

You may be eligible for the free vaccine at your GP or local pharmacy if you are 50 and over, pregnant or have certain health conditions. Find out if you are eligible at www.nhs.uk/conditions/vaccinations/flu-influenza-vaccine.

Children up to year 11 (and children aged 17 years with long-term health condition) can get the free nasal spray at school or through their GP if they are below school age.

If you are not eligible for the free vaccine, you can pay for it at your local pharmacy.

The flu vaccination does not give you flu. It reduces the risk of catching flu, as well as spreading it to others. If you had the vaccination in the past, that will not protect you as the flu strain changes every year, so you need to have a new one this year.

It is also important to wash your hands often with warm water and soap, use tissues when you cough or sneeze and bin used tissues as quickly as possible.

- 1. When you are invited by the NHS, you can book at your local GP, pharmacy or vaccination site
- 2. No invite yet? Book online or via 119 for an appointment at a pharmacy or vaccination site

Bramcote Crematorium Raises £10,000 for Local Charity

Bramcote Crematorium has raised over £10,000 for a local bereavement charity thanks to its recycling scheme.

Survivors of Bereavement by Suicide is the only organisation offering peer-to-peer support to all those over the age of 18 impacted by suicide loss in the UK. They help those bereaved by suicide to support each other, at the time of their loss and in the months and years that follow. They are a self-help organisation and provide a safe, confidential environment in which bereaved people can share their experiences and feelings, so giving and gaining support from each other. They strive to improve public awareness and maintain contacts with many other statutory and voluntary organisations.



The Crematorium has been working with families and Orthometals as part of the scheme, which enables bereaved families to donate metals which remain after the cremation process.

Once the metals, which range from metals used in coffins to orthopaedic implants, are received by Orthometals, they make a donation based on the value of these recycled metals to charities nominated by the Crematorium.

The recycling process only takes place with full consent of the deceased's family.

Louise Singer, Bereavement Services Manager at the Crematorium said; "Bereavement is a very difficult time so it's fantastic to see something positive to come from it and support others who are in a similar position. Thank you to all the families who supported the scheme and have helped us raised this fantastic amount for Survivors of Bereavement by Suicide."

Over £8 million has been donated to charities since the national scheme began and this year a record amount of £1 million pounds is due to be donated in the next round of recycling nominations.

Broxtowe Mayor gets on his bike for charity cycle

The Mayor of Broxtowe, Councillor Richard MacRae, led a charity bike ride on Saturday 25 September to help raise money for his chosen charity, Broxtowe Youth Homelessness.

The Mayor and 20 fellow riders set off from the Heritage Centre at Beeston Rylands and cycled seven miles to Notts County FC on Meadow Lane and then returned to Beeston.

Participants were asked to pay £5 to take part and were also encouraged to raise additional sponsorship from family and friends. In total more than £2,000 has been raised so far with more donations still to come.

Cllr MacRae said: "As a keen cyclist, I wanted to encourage others to get on their bikes and help me raise money for a fantastic charity. Big thanks to the local businesses who donated some great prizes, Rocky Riders, Bike Inn and The Cycle Lounge. It was great to see you all and we hope to do another one next year."

Jessica Brannan from Broxtowe Youth Homelessness said: "Last year over 120,000 young people across the UK experienced homelessness. Broxtowe Youth Homelessness works with 16-25 year olds across Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire, who are at risk of, or have experienced homelessness, empowering them to build a better future for themselves. The money we raise from the bike ride will help us to continue providing our vital services - everything from the drop-in centre to training and volunteer opportunities, as well as emergency food and toiletry parcels. In the past year alone we have helped over 200 young people."

Day to day running costs of Council services (except Council Housing) e.g. salaries, transport, general office running costs and income from fees and charges.

The Council spent a net £8.9m less than it received in funding and £2.1m less than it planned to spend.

The Budget Challenge

Government funding was provided to local authorities to help offset the reduction in council tax received from tax payers and business rates received from reatepayers as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic. A proportion of this funding, amounting

Where does your Council Tax go?

Council Tax is set annually and the money you pay is used to fund local services. Around 8% of your Council Tax goes towards funding services provided by Broxtowe Borough Council. The rest goes to Nottinghamshire County Council, Nottinghamshire Police, Nottinghamshire Fire and Rescue and your Parish Council.



Well for Work

- 1. In cold weather try and keep temperatures between 18-21^oC in main living areas whilst indoors
- 2. Don't block airbricks or air vents
- 3. To kill and remove mould wipe down wall and window frames with a fungicidal wash which carries a Health & Safety Executive approved number
- 4. Dry washing outside whenever possible
- 5. Don't dry clothes on radiators. This will make your boiler work harder to heat your house and cost almost as much as using a tumble dryer, whilst creating a lot of condensation
- 6. If you have to dry clothing indoors and don't have a tumble dryer, place clothes on a drying rack in a sunny room where a window can be opened slightly and keep the door closed
- 7. No drying rack? Put your clothes on hangers and hang from a curtain pole above a slightly opened window; this can also reduce the need for ironing

159 Pilot to Prevent Fraud

If you think someone is trying to trick you into handing over money or personal details...

...Stop, hang up and call 159 to speak directly to your bank.

Last year criminal gangs stole over £470m by pretending to be your bank or other service provider.

159 is the memorable, secure number that connects you directly to your bank if you think you're being scammed. 159 works in the same way as 101 for the police or 111 for the NHS. It's the number you can trust to get you through to your bank, every time. **159 will never call you.** Only a fraudster will object to you calling 159.

When should I call 159?

Call 159 if:

- Someone contacts you saying they're from your bank – even if they are not suspicious
- You receive a call asking you to transfer money or make a payment – even if it seems genuine
- You receive a call about a financial matter and it seems suspicious

Remember, 159 will never call you. But you can rely on 159 to get you through to your bank.

Who is behind 159?

159 has been set up by banks and telephone companies who want to fight fraud. It's a pilot scheme at the moment. The following banks are part of it:

- Barclays
- Lloyds (including Halifax and Bank of Scotland)
- NatWest (including Royal Bank of Scotland and Ulster Bank)
- Santander
- · Starling Bank

That covers over 70% of UK primary current account holders.





We want more banks to join us, and we hope they will over the course of the pilot.

Will it definitely work on my telephone?

Almost all major consumer telephone companies are participating, and almost all UK mobiles and landlines are able to use 159.

The telephone companies are:

- · BT, including EE and Plusnet
- Gamma
- · O2, including giffgaff
- TalkTalk
- Three
- · Virgin Media
- Sky
- Vodafone

What happens if 159 doesn't work, for any reason?

You should contact your bank in the normal way, using the number on your bank card.

How much does it cost to call 159?

Calling 159 will cost the same as a national rate call; usually part of the included minutes in most phone tariffs.

What's the idea behind the 159 pilot?

159 is a pilot scheme – the idea is to collect evidence to show that calling 159 helps fight fraud. Then we want to make 159 a universal number – available on all phones and for all banks.



Being a Good Neighbour

With many of us spending more time at home at the moment, we all need to be mindful and show considerations to our neighbours.

Be mindful of your actions

Please be considerate and ensure your actions do not disturb your neighbours. The volume of music, the times that you are doing any DIY and spending time in the garden or on balconies can disrupt others near us if we are not considerate. Avoid bonfires - Coronavirus is known to cause serious respiratory problems, which could be made much worse with exposure to smoke from bonfires.

Be a little more tolerant during this time

With more of us staying at home, there will be more noise from children playing in their garden, or neighbours using this time to do some DIY. Try to be more tolerant of them.

Clean up after yourself

If you've been in a communal area, or taken your daily walk, please take any litter home with you.

Don't dump bulky waste

Please be considerate to your neighbours and don't leave dumped items for others to clear up. Dumped items cause a health and safety risk for you and your neighbours, especially at this time.

Talk to you neighbours from a distance

Just talking, can make a huge difference to how you and others feel. We are all in this together – but remember to keep following social distancing.

White Ribbon is a global campaign that encourages people, especially men and boys, to individually and collectively take action and change the behaviour and culture that leads to abuse and violence. To wear a white ribbon is to promise to never to commit, excuse or remain silent about male violence against women.

Commitments made by Broxtowe Borough Council in tackling domestic abuse have included recruiting a new staff member to lead on the coordination of its domestic abuse services and their White Ribbon action plan includes the establishment of a multi-agency steering group to lead the initiative, the appointment of a number White Ribbon ambassadors amongst staff, improving staff training and policies and procedures and looking at opportunities to work with different community groups and initiatives to raise awareness and increase engagement.

Stay Safe This Winter


During the darker nights and festive celebrations, follow these simple safety tips:

- · Stay alert and be aware of what's going on around you, especially in busy shops and crowded streets where thieves and pickpockets may well be operating.
- Keep doors, gates and windows locked
- Invest in a security light/burglar alarm
- Make your house look occupied, use a timer switch to operate lamps as it starts to get dark, leave a radio on.
- Don't leave Christmas presents on view
- Keep bags, purses and wallets secure
- · Take care walking home, stick to well-lit areas and park in a car park displaying Park Mark signage www.parkmark.co.uk
- Don't use a cash point if you see anything suspicious
- Ensure your PIN cannot be seen
- Ensure someone knows where you are and when you'll be home
- Drink responsibly and don't drink and drive.
- Watch your drinks and food to ensure that nothing is added to them. Never leave your drink unattended, even if you are going to dance or to the toilet. If your drink has been left unattended, don't drink any more of it. If something tastes or looks odd, don't eat/drink any more of it. Be aware, though, that some drugs are colourless and tasteless.
